Patrick McDonnell

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Patrick McDonnell (born March 17, 1956) is a cartoonist, author, and playwright. He is the creator of the daily comic strip Mutts, which follows the adventures of a dog and a cat, that has been syndicated since 1994. Prior to creating Mutts, he was a prolific magazine illustrator, and would frequently include a dog in the backgrounds of his drawings.

McDonnell's picture book, The Gift of Nothing, was adapted as a musical for the Kennedy Center stage, as was his picture book about the childhood of Jane Goodall, Me . . . Jane, which won a Caldecott Honor in 2012. His work has been animated for television commercials, most notably a public service announcement for the NY Philharmonic. He is a co-author of Krazy Kat: The Comic Art of George Herriman, published in 1986 by Abrams Books.

McDonnell is involved with many animal and environmental charities. His characters have been used by the United States Marines, the American Library Association, and by the Humane Society of the United States. The Mutts characters appear on the New Jersey

Animal Friendly license plates, which fund state pet population programs.

He won the Harvey Award for Best Comic Strip eight times, and has been given four...

Mary McDonnell

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Mary Eileen McDonnell (born April 28, 1952) is an American film, stage, and television actress. She received Academy Award nominations for her roles as Stands With A Fist in Dances With Wolves and May-Alice Culhane in Passion Fish. McDonnell is well known for her performances as President Laura Roslin in Battlestar Galactica, First Lady Marilyn Whitmore in Independence Day, and Rose in Donnie Darko. She was featured as Captain Sharon Raydor during seasons 5–7 of the TNT series The Closer and starred as Commander Sharon Raydor in the spin-off series Major Crimes on the same network. In 2023, she played Madeleine Usher in the miniseries The Fall of the House of Usher on Netflix.

== Early life and education ==

Mary Eileen McDonnell was born April 28, 1952, in Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania, one of six children born to Eileen (née Mundy) and John "Jack" McDonnell, a computer consultant. She is of Irish descent and was raised Roman Catholic. As a child, McDonnell relocated with her family to Ithaca, New York, where she spent the remainder of her upbringing.

She attended the State University of New York at Fredonia.

McDonnell's father died when she was 21 years old.

Mutts (comic strip)

as well as the animals around their neighborhood.

Mutts has received numerous awards internationally, both for comic strip excellence and for its themes of animal protection. Peanuts creator Charles Schulz praised Mutts, calling it "one of the best comic strips of all time."

== Characters and story ==

1983 Harrods bombing

A car bomb exploded outside Harrods department store in central London, England, on 17 December 1983. Members of the Provisional Irish Republican Army planted the time bomb and sent a warning 37 minutes before it exploded, but the area was not evacuated. The blast killed three police officers and three civilians, injured 86 people, and caused much damage. The IRA Army Council said it had not authorised the attack and expressed regret for the civilian casualties. After the bombing, the IRA shifted its emphasis towards attacks on military targets in England.

== Other attacks on Harrods ==

Harrods is a large department store in the affluent Knightsbridge district, near Buckingham Palace. Harrods had been the target of other IRA bombings. On 18 August 1973, two fire bombs exploded causing slight damage. On 21 December 1974, a fire bomb was placed in the north-east corner of the first floor. There was a very short warning and the store was in the process of being cleared when it exploded. The 1974 bomb was the work of the Balcombe Street Gang who also carried out high-profile bombings in Knightsbridge, Piccadilly, Oxford Street, Woolwich, and many other locations in London and Surrey in...

== Early life ==

Ian Reginald Edward Gow was born at 3 Upper Harley Street, London on Thursday 11 February 1937. He was the son of Alexander Edward Gow, a London doctor attached to St Bartholomew's Hospital who died in September 1952. Ian Gow was educated at Sandroyd School and then Winchester College, where he was president of the debating society. During a period of national service from 1955 to 1958 he was commissioned in the 15th/19th Hussars and served in Northern Ireland, Germany and Malaya. He subsequently served in the territorial army until 1976, attaining the rank of major.

After completing national service he took up a career in the law and qualified as a solicitor in 1962. He eventually became a partner in the London practice of Joynson-Hicks and Co. He also became a Conservative Party activist. He stood for Parliament in the Coventry East constituency for the...

Clare Boylan (21 April 1948 – 16 May 2006) was an Irish author, journalist and critic for newspapers, magazines and many international broadcast media.

== Life and career ==

Born in Dublin, Ireland, on 21 April 1948, to Patrick and Evelyn Boylan (née Selby), Boylan began her career as a journalist at the now defunct Irish Press. In 1974, she won the Journalist of the Year award when working in the city for the Evening Press. There she met her husband, fellow journalist Alan Wilkes. From 1981, Boylan edited the glossy magazine Image, before largely giving up journalism to focus on a career as an author in 1984.

Her novels are Holy Pictures (1983), Last Resorts (1984), Black Baby (1988), Home Rule (1992), Beloved Stranger (1999), Room for a Single Lady (1997) – which won the Spirit of Light Award and was optioned for a film – and Emma Brown (2003). The latter work is a continuation of a 20-page fragment written by Charlotte Brontë before her death.

Boylan's short stories are collected in *A Nail on the Head* (1983), *Concerning Virgins* (1990) and *That Bad Woman* (1995). The film *Making Waves*, based on her short story "Some Ladies on a Tour", was nominated for an Oscar in 1988.

Wendy Crewson

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Wendy Jane Crewson (born May 9, 1956) is a Canadian actress and producer. She began her career on Canadian television, before her breakthrough role in the 1991 dramatic film *The Doctor*.

Crewson has appeared in many Hollywood films, including *The Good Son* (1993), *The Santa Clause* (1994) and its sequels *The Santa Clause 2* (2002) and *The Santa Clause 3: The Escape Clause* (2006), *To Gillian on Her 37th Birthday* (1996), *Air Force One* (1997), *Bicentennial Man* (1999), *What Lies Beneath* (2000), *The 6th Day* (2000), *The Covenant* (2006) and *Eight Below* (2006). Crewson has won six Gemini Awards, two Canadian Screen Awards and an ACTRA Award for her performances on television. She had recurring roles on American television series *24* and *Revenge*, and the Canadian television series *Frankie Drake Mysteries*. From 2012 to 2017, Crewson co-starred in the CTV medical drama *Saving...*

Pat Quinn (politician)

Patrick Joseph Quinn (born December 16, 1948) is an American politician who served as the 41st governor of Illinois from 2009 to 2015. A Democrat, Quinn

A Democrat, Quinn began his career as a political activist, founding the Coalition for Political Honesty, which organized citizen-initiated referendums advocating political reform. He later served as a commissioner on the Cook County Board of Tax Appeals from 1982 to 1986, Illinois Treasurer from 1991 to 1995, and the 45th lieutenant governor of Illinois from 2003 to 2009.

Born in Chicago, Illinois, Quinn is a graduate of Georgetown University and Northwestern University School of Law. He began his political career working as a campaign organizer and then aide to Illinois Governor Dan Walker before launching a series of citizen-led petition drives, including the 1976 Political Honesty Initiative and the 1980 Cutback Amendment, which reduced the size of the Illinois House of Representatives from 177 to 118. The amendment marked the first and only time Illinois voters used the initiative process to enact a constitutional amendment or law.

After the passage of the Cutback Amendment, Quinn continued to organize petition drives and was elected as a Commissioner...

The year 1952 in film involved some significant events in cinema history, including the releases of *Ivanhoe*, *Singin' in the Rain*, and the Best Picture-winning *The Greatest Show on Earth*.

== Events ==

January 10 - Cecil B. DeMille's circus epic, *The Greatest Show on Earth*, is premièred at Radio City Music Hall in New York City.

March 27 - The MGM musical *Singin' in the Rain* premieres at Radio City Music Hall in New York City.

May 26 - Decision reached in *Joseph Burstyn, Inc. v. Wilson* determining that certain provisions of the New York Education Law allowing a censor to forbid the commercial showing of any non-licensed motion picture film, or revoke or deny the license of a film deemed to be "sacrilegious," was a "restraint on freedom of speech" and thereby a violation of the First Amendment to the United States Constitution.

September 19 - While Charlie Chaplin is at sea on his way to the United Kingdom, the United States Attorney-General, James P. McGranery, announces plans to review his right to return to the US.

September 30 - The Cinerama multiple-projection widescreen system, invented by Fred Waller, makes its début in New York with the film *This Is Cinerama*.
