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RNDr. Vladimír Socha (born 1 January 1982 in Hradec Králové) is a Czech writer, publisher, public lecturer and science promoter from the city Hradec Králové (north-eastern Czech Republic). His Czech academic title is RNDr. – Rerum Naturalium Doctor – "The Doctor of Natural Sciences". His main interest lies in dinosaur paleontology and the history of science in general. So far, he published about twenty books about dinosaurs and primeval life in Czech, nine smaller brochures (booklets) and hundreds of magazine articles about nature, history and prehistory. In 2009 he volunteered in the summer paleontological field dig in the Hell Creek formation in eastern Montana (for the Museum of the Rockies in Bozeman). A year later, he published a book about the experience called Dinosauri od Pekelného potoka ("Dinosaurs from the Hell Creek"). He also provides interviews for the Czech Radio and Czech Television and sometimes organises paleoart exhibitions.

My Brother Chases Dinosaurs

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My Brother Chases Dinosaurs (Italian: Mio fratello rincorre i dinosauri, Spanish: Mi hermano persigue dinosaurios) is a 2019 Italian-Spanish comedy film directed by Stefano Cipani. It is based on the best-selling autobiographical novel with the same name by Giacomo Mazzariol.

The film premiered at the 76th edition of the Venice Film Festival, in the Giornate degli Autori sidebar. It won the European Film Academy Young Audience Award at the 33rd European Film Awards.

== Plot ==

Giacomo "Jack" is a child who lives in Pieve di Cento, with his parents Davide and Katia and his older sisters Chiara and Alice. One day he receives the news that he will

soon have a brother, who will be called Giovanni (Giò). When his little brother is born, Jack and his family discover that Giovanni has Down syndrome. Initially Jack is happy, because he believes that his little brother is some kind of superhero, but over time he will understand that his parents have let him believe something very different from reality.

Years later Jack has to choose a high school together with Vittorio (Vitto), his best friend ever. Jack meets Arianna there and falls in love, then decides to enter the same school as the girl...

Dinosaur Quarry of Altamura

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The Dinosaur Quarry of Altamura, also known as cava dei dinosauri or cava Pontrelli, is an area of scientific interest located in the countryside of the city of Altamura, Italy, where about 4000 footprints of dinosaurs have been found (according to other sources, they are much more than 4000). It was originally an abandoned quarry located in an area named Pontrelli located on "Via Santeramo", where a kind of carbonate rock known as calcare di Altamura used to be extracted. It originally belonged to the De Lucia family and, after a few changes of ownership, in 2016 it was expropriated. Now it belongs to the Municipality of Altamura due to the remarkable scientific relevance of the discovery.

== History of the discovery ==

The dinosaur footprints were accidentally discovered on May 10, 1999, by two marine geologists of the University of Ancona, Michele Claps and Massimo Sarti, while they were carrying out research on behalf of the company Tamoil. Shortly thereafter, Italian paleontologist and ichnologist Umberto Nicosia searched the area, confirming the authenticity of the discovery and in 1999 he introduced, on the basis of the surveys inside the quarry and together with other collaborators...

Jan Sovák (13 February 1953 – 14 April 2025) was a Czech paleoartist and painter. He illustrated more than 300 books and created many paintings for scientists including paleontologist Phil Currie and dinosaur writer Don "Dino" Lessem. His sculptures and paintings are prominently featured at the Natural History Museum in Prague. Many of his paintings depict dinosaurs and other prehistoric life.

== Life and career ==

Sovák was born in Tábor in the former Czechoslovakia, and was inspired from an early

age by the Czech palaeoartist Zdeněk Burian. He moved to Canada in 1982, returning to live in the Czech Republic in 2017 and was living in Příbram at the time of his death. His work has been published in publications written in more than fifteen languages. More than forty museums around the world house examples of his art on prehistoric animals, and his illustrations have also appeared on educational television, including in twelve films on the Discovery Channel.

During his paleoart career, he collaborated also with numerous Czech paleontologists and writers, such as Zdeněk Špinar and Vladimír Socha.

Montemarcello Formation

The dinosaurs of Italy and adjacent areas in G. Leonardi & P. Mietto (ed.), *Dinosauri in Italia - The Montemarcello Formation is a Late Triassic (Carnian) geologic formation in Liguria, Italy. Fossil prosauropod tracks have been reported from the formation.*

== Description ==

The formation comprises arenites with a few thin clayey inter-beds. The sands overlie micro-conglomeratic bodies up to 1 metre (3.3 ft) thick. Two-dimensional ripple marks (with wavelengths of nearly 20 centimetres (7.9 in)), larger ripples (wavelengths of 120 centimetres (47 in)), interference ripples, and mud cracks were recognized. The arenitic beds are also characterized by internal structures such as accretionary laminae, coalescent bodies, low-angle lamination, and cross stratification. Some arenitic levels are deeply bioturbated, both by simple vertical tubes and by larger horizontal ones. Rare small wood fragments were recognized. Small channels, up to 1.5 metres (4.9 ft) over a very short distance, cut the arenitic bodies.

Monte Pelmo

Monte Pelmo is a mountain of the Dolomites, in the province of Belluno, Northeastern Italy.

The mountain resembles a giant block which stands isolated from other peaks, so can be seen clearly from the neighbouring valleys and from nearby mountains such as Antelao and Monte Civetta.

Monte Pelmo was the first major Dolomite peak to be climbed; Irishman John Ball, who later became president of the UK's Alpine Club, succeeded in his ascent in 1857. He set out with a chamois hunter from the Boite valley towards Monte Pelmo. Over the long ledge named after Ball, which the chamois hunters refused to cross, Ball got into the large cirque, through which he climbed over the small Pelmo glacier to below the

summit structure.

West of the summit lies a secondary peak, Pelmetto (meaning "Little Pelmo" in Italian), at 2,990m high, which has a 1,100-metre (3,609 ft) high north face.

There are only a few possibilities for climbing the peak, owing to its unique structure. The best known (and easiest) ascent leads over the south-east flank. The route of the first climbers still offers a rewarding but long and strenuous mountain tour in the second degree of difficulty. Problems can be found with the above...
